By Representative Miranda of Boston and Senator Collins, a joint petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Liz Miranda and Nick Collins for an investigation and study by a special commission (including members of the General Court) relative to race in the Commonwealth. State Administration and Regulatory Oversight.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

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**In the One Hundred and Ninety-First General Court
(2019-2020)**
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Resolve establishing the truth and reconciliation commission.

1 Resolved, That there shall be a special commission established pursuant to section 2A of
2 chapter 4 to be known as the Truth and Reconciliation Commission for the purpose of making an
3 investigation and study relative to race in Massachusetts, including but not limited to: slavery
4 and interactions with slave fueled-industries; immigration and emigration; and institutionalized
5 racism. The commission shall also identify possible areas for legislative solutions, including
6 ameliorative race-based policies and racial justice initiatives.

7 The commission shall consist of: 3 members of the senate, 1 of whom shall be appointed
8 by the senate president and who shall serve as co-chairperson, 1 of whom shall be appointed by
9 the minority leader and 1 of whom shall be appointed by the chair of the Massachusetts Black
10 and Latino Legislative Caucus; 3 members of the house of representatives, 1 of whom shall be
11 appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives and who shall serve as co-chairperson, 1
12 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader and 1 of whom shall be appointed by the chair
13 of the Massachusetts Black and Latino Legislative Caucus; the mayor of the city of Boston or a

14 designee; the executive director of the Massachusetts Black and Latino Legislative Caucus or a
15 designee; the chair of the black advisory commission or a designee; the executive director of the
16 New Democracy Coalition, Inc. or a designee; 3 persons to be appointed by the governor, 1 of
17 whom shall be selected from a list of 3 nominees provided by a registered Massachusetts affiliate
18 of the National Urban League, Inc. designated by the co-chairs, 1 of whom shall be selected from
19 a list of 3 nominees provided by the NAACP Boston Branch and 1 of whom shall be selected
20 from a list of 3 nominees provided by the New England Area Conference of the NAACP; 3
21 experts in race, African-American history or cultural studies to be appointed by the co-chairs, 1
22 of whom shall be from a state college or university, 1 of whom shall be a representative of a
23 private college or university located within the commonwealth and 1 of whom shall be a
24 representative of the Museum of African American History, Incorporated; and up to 5 additional
25 persons to be appointed by the co-chairs, all of whom shall be representatives from different
26 racial justice organizations chosen by the co-chairs not otherwise having representation on the
27 commission.

28 The commission shall file its report, together with the results of its study,
29 recommendations and drafts of recommended legislation, with the clerks of the senate and house
30 of representatives and to the chairs of the senate and house committees on ways and means not
31 later than June 30, 2021.
